#### **About Ontario's Big City Mayors (OBCM)**

- Ontario's Big City Mayors (OBCM) represents cities with populations of 100,000 or more, providing a voice for big city mayors in policy and program decisions that impact Ontario cities.
- Collectively, Ontario's Big City Mayors represent nearly 70% of Ontario's population.
- Through policy development, advocacy, discussion and partnerships, Ontario's Big City Mayors support strong and effective cities.





In August 2024, OBCM launched **Solve the Crisis**, a project calling on the provincial government to take immediate action to address the **homelessness and mental health issues** in cities across Ontario.



# What is the Solve The Crisis campaign?

- Solve the Crisis brought together OBCM members in a campaign to raise public, media, and government awareness of the homelessness, mental health and addictions issues our communities are facing.
- Solve the Crisis has changed the conversation about action needed from the provincial government.
- To be successful, this campaign must be sustained through the next provincial budget and election cycle and beyond.





### What led to this Crisis?

- 1. Inadequate provincial and federal support: Municipalities don't have the funding, resources or expertise to solve the mental health and addictions issues facing our communities alone. Ad hoc provincial and
- **2. Encampment population is growing:** At last count, there were over 1,400 encampments in Ontario, and that figure is only rising.

federal funding doesn't allow for long-term investment.

- **3. Lack of provincial coordination:** There are 16 provincial ministries with responsibility for homelessness, mental health and addictions. We need a coordinated response between municipalities, the province and the federal government.
- 4. Safety concerns across Ontario: Residents are avoiding public spaces or downtown businesses and have real concerns about safety and security in their local communities.


### What do we need to **Solve the Crisis?**

#### Our asks are simple...

- 1. Appoint a responsible ministry and Minister with the appropriate funding and powers as a single point of contact to address the full spectrum of housing needs as well as mental health, addictions and wrap around supports.
- 2. Create an action table with sector representatives including municipalities, health care leaders, first responders, community services, the business community, and the tourism industry to develop an Ontario Action Plan.
- 3. Provide municipalities with tools and resources, to transition those in encampments to more appropriate supports, including treatment and recovery programs, when deemed necessary.
- **4. Commit to funding services** our unhoused population needs, community by community, to fill in gaps in the system.
- 5. Invest in 24/7 Community Hubs / Crisis Centres to relieve pressure on emergency centres and first responders.

### Next steps

- ✓ Talk to provincial officials and ask the Ontario Government to take action now to support municipalities on the ground to solve the crisis.
- ✓ Put forward and back motions at municipal councils calling on higher levels of government to take immediate action to fund our asks.
- ✓ Do (coordinated) media events. Proclaim a municipal Day of Action on Homelessness and coordinate with other municipalities to raise public and media awareness.
- ✓ Reach out to sector organizations in your community to endorse and spread the word about SolveTheCrisis.ca.



### There is hope!

- Combining mental health and addiction services with supportive housing is a proven solution in municipalities across the province:
  - Homes First Toronto: Reported on 530 residents who were successfully transitioned to permanent housing in 2023.
  - House of Hope London: ER visits by supportive housing residents dropped by 74 per cent over the same period in 2022.
- More affordable housing options and increasing access to mental health and addictions care are priorities for all levels of government.
- We need the province and federal government to come to table and work with municipalities to implement solutions that will help our communities and residents thrive.





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
