- OAHS is the largest provincial Indigenous non-profit housing provider in Ontario
- Our mandate is to provide safe and affordable housing to First Nation, Inuit, and Métis people living in urban and rural communities across the province.
- Our vision is to lead the design, development, and delivery of a sustainable and culturally appropriate continuum of housing that supports urban Indigenous community wellbeing.



Supportive Housing: What's Needed First



- Awareness of Indigenous housing need
- Commitment to Reconciliation:
 - Articles 21 & 23 of the United Nations
 Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous

 Peoples
 - The Recommendations of the National Inquiry on Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls
 - Honouring the Spirit of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada
- Building strong relationships
- Securing serviced land



How OAHS Develops Supportive Housing




- Community need drives supportive housing
- We work with community partners on:
 - Opportunities for land
 - Committed long-term Indigenous operators
 - Long-term operational funding commitments
- Community engagement
- Apply for multiple sources of funding: capital and operating
- Design process with Indigenous community
- Construction
- Operations for the next seven generations



Supportive Housing in Sioux Lookout





- 20 studio units with kitchenettes
- (mix of men and women's units)
- Supportive housing for people who are experiencing homelessness
- Onsite program room, dining, and common space with commercial kitchen

Supportive Housing: Urban Indigenous Homeward Bound in Dryden



Friendship Centre Program

Renovated vacant school, 10 Units:

- (5) three bedroom units,
- (5) four bedroom units and
- On-site daycare and programs room
- All units are rented inclusive of utilities at affordable rates

Supportive Housing:

Urban Indigenous Homeward Bound in Sault Ste. Marie



- Friendship Centre Program
- 11 units on-site:
 - (4) two-bedroom units,
 - (6) three-bedroom units,
 - (1) four-bedroom units and
 - On-site daycare and programs room
 - All units are rented inclusive of utilities at affordable rates.

Supportive Housing: **Kenora**

- 30 studio units (mix of men and women's units)
- Supportive housing for people who are experiencing homelessness
- 24/7 supportive services from Waasegiizhig Nanaandawe'iyewigamig (WNHAC)
- Has a commercial kitchen which provides meals for the tenants and teaching kitchen
- Large program room; offices; staff room
- Received occupancy permit in July 2024

Supportive Housing:

Thunder Bay Youth Transitional Housing

- Construction started in November 2023
- 58 units:
 - 28 pod-style
 - 30 one-bedroom
- Cultural activities and teachings
- Completely furnished
- Communal teaching kitchen
- 24/7 on-site supportive programs and Case Managers for residents
- Completion Date: December 2025

Cochrane:

- > 10 units
- Operated by Inninew Friendship Centre
- Sturgeon Falls:
 - 6 units
 - Operated by Mkaana-wii-giiwe'aad program
- Sioux Lookout:
 - Pre- and post-natal supportive housing
 - Operated by First Step Women's Shelter
- London:
 - Urban Indigenous Homeward Bound with daycare
 - Operated by N'Amerind Friendship Centre
- Sault Ste. Marie:
 - > 30 Studio Apartments
 - Operated by SSM Indigenous Friendship Centre







Supportive Housing: Lessons Learned



- Supportive housing will look different in every part of the province
- Transfer of knowledge is essential during the development process
- Indigenous-led supportive housing is owned and operated by the Indigenous community
 - Indigenous supportive housing must reflect the people the housing serves
